CARE FOR A POT OF TEA?

You may have noticed that the Aurora Historical Society (AHS) is hosting more afternoon teas this year! Whether you attended our *Mother's Day Afternoon Tea*, or are planning on coming to one of the summer tea events, it is an experience to be remembered. Dressing up in your best clothes and enjoying delicious scones on a historic property is entertaining but also meaningful. Did you know that there is a long history of high teas in Aurora which served a greater purpose?

Thinking back to World War I, high teas were organized in an effort to fundraise for the war effort. Since most ladies remained in the community at that time, they used what resources they had available to help raise funds for soldiers overseas. What do you say we make a bunch of finger sandwiches, add little cakes to the tray, a large pot of tea, and ask the guests for donations when they arrive to visit? Of course, we know that these events took a lot more work and planning, but the concept was a simple and hopeful one. Additional focuses of these teas included supporting the families left behind during the war and spreading the word about peacekeeping. So much

influence for positive change was in the hands of women holding their dainty teacups. With afternoon teas, the power of conversation, deep pockets, and genuine kindness went a long way.

Across from The Manor (Hillary House's name), Joseph Fleury's notable property, Inglehurst, was a frequent spot for afternoon teas. When his son, Herbert Fleury, came to live in the home with his family, he supported the war effort by hosting massive tea parties to raise money for the Girls' Red Cross Auxiliary.

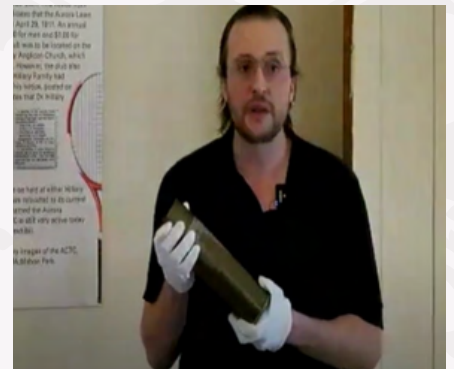

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Even people from outside of Aurora were drawn into Herbert's tea events, aiding tremendously with wartime contributions. The ladies of the Hillary family were often at these Red Cross teas, helping with organizing, socializing, and increasing attendance.

Originally, afternoon high tea did not have such a noble cause. Quite simply, teatime served to carry over hunger between lunch and dinner. In the early Victorian period, Anne, the seventh Duchess of Bedford, would be feeling snackish at around 4pm and would thus request some tea, bread and butter.¹



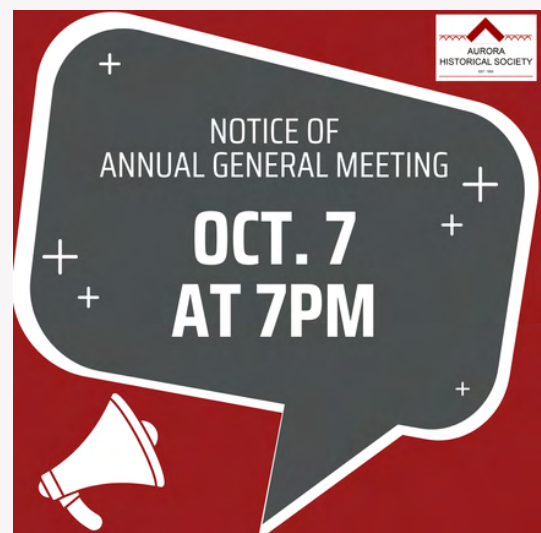

Duchess Anne eventually decided to have some company join her, making the snacks more elaborate, and of course, guests would arrive beautifully dressed to be presentable in her presence. Afternoon tea started trending, serving as an opportunity to socialize, show off the quality and variety of your wardrobe, and enjoy lavish snacks. Today, it is not much different. Afternoon tea is now realized as going to a beautiful space to have delicious food, meet with trusted (and fashionable)

friends, maybe to exchange gossip or divulge secrets, and leaving the mini party feeling your best.

You may be starting to understand why the AHS has planned for more afternoon teas this year. Over the past few years, we have developed a smooth system of operations for our afternoon teas, picking up interest and momentum in the community. We have also perfected a lot of the event details thanks to attendee feedback. In addition to the annual *Mother's Day Tea* in May and *Victorian Harvest Tea* in September, we now have a *Victorian Garden Party* in July (with live music and activities), as well as our *Children's Teddy Bear Tea* returning for a second year in a row this August.

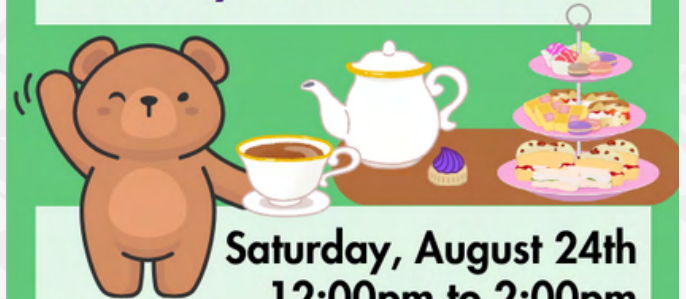

AURORA THROUGH THE ARCHIVES

Do you remember the Aurora Horse Show at Town Park, or maybe when it was in Machell Park? What about the Aurora Public Library when it was on Victoria Street, or swimming in the George Street Pool? If you are looking for a trip down memory lane or you are interested in seeing what it was like as a child in Aurora over the last 100 years, visit our new exhibition *Aurora Through the Archives: Growing Up Aurora* and *Through the Hillary Lens*, on display at Hillary House National Historic Site from May 6th to June 29th.



Aurora Through the Archives: Growing Up Aurora

Growing Up Aurora showcases photographs and stories from the 1940s to the 2000s from people who live or lived in Aurora. Bound to bring back memories from your own childhood, this display shows that although there have been many changes to Aurora over the years, you'll be surprised by what has stayed the same. *Through the Hillary Lens* is a carefully curated compilation of archival photographs from the Hillary House collection. It provides a glimpse into the life of the Hillary children from the 1880s to the 1920s. This display evokes familiarity and exemplifies the universality of the childhood experience.

The displays at Hillary House are part of the larger *Aurora Through the Archives* exhibition which is a collaboration between the AHS, Aurora Museum and Archives, Niagara College - Aurora Armoury, and Royal Rose Art Gallery & Gifts. There are additional displays at Royal Rose Art Gallery and the Armoury which use archival images from the Aurora Museum & Archives.

These displays were curated by Amanda Jenkins, Sophie Langille, and Maddison Dearlove-Marshall, Master of Museum Studies students from the University of Toronto. The exhibition is part of the 2024 CONTACT Photography Festival, an annual festival based in Toronto that has grown since 1997 to become one of the world's largest photography festivals.

In early 2024, we received a generous offer from Dr. Leslie Oliver in the form of a \$10,000 legacy donation.

Dr. Oliver, a third generation Auroran, founded the AHS back in 1963 as an advocacy body for local heritage. He was also an important figure in preserving some of Aurora's treasures including Church Street School and the Grand Trunk Railway station, now used by GO Transit.

The Oliver family are generous supporters of the AHS and the Aurora Museum & Archives, even donating a large collection of archival material to the Museum & Archives in 2021.

We thank the Dr. Oliver and his wife Mary Jeanne for their generosity and continuous commitment to Aurora's heritage preservation.

FENCE UPDATE

If you have been past Hillary House in the last couple of weeks, you will have noticed that three sections of the fence closest to the driveway are damaged. On the night of May 23rd, an incident resulted in a vehicle hitting the fence.



Damage to our heritage fence occurred afterhours on Thursday, May 23rd, 2024.

We have been in contact with Parks Canada who completed the restoration of the fence in May 2023, as well as several contractors to arrange for repairs. We expect the fence to be repaired by the end of the summer.

A NEW CHAPTER
